Ask the DRC

Trash Container Storage

- Q. I don't have room in my garage, can I store my trash/recycling containers outside?
- A. The new containers, depending on the quantity and sizes you ordered, can be large and take up more room in your garage. The Rules and Regulations state, "When carts are not placed for pickup, trash, recycle materials, and trash and recycling carts must be secured to prevent access by animals or insects and must be stored in a garage or other area not visible from another Dwelling Unit, a Village roadway or other Common Area, or a golf course.

- Q. May I purchase a shed or have a fenced area built to store my carts?
- **A.** As with all exterior improvements, the Design Review Committee (DRC) must review and approve the improvement which includes any additions, storage structures, fences or walls for concealment of trash containers. When it comes to out buildings, the structure must reflect the architecture and materials of the home. Should you desire an addition to the home, it must integrate with the home and look as if it is part of the original home design.
- Q. How do I contact the DRC for questions or review of my improvement?

Homes Association Monthly Assessment Coupons

More and more residents are opting for recurring bill pay through their bank or using the Homes Association direct debit to pay their monthly assessments. Due to the increase in use of these payment options, the Homes Association will not be mailing payment coupons to residents for your 2024 assessments unless requested. The direct debit method is a safe, secure, and efficient way to pay your assessments.

Jogging in the Snow

Exercise has short and long-term benefits, including better mood, lower blood pressure, and a lower risk for heart disease and type-2 diabetes. But here in Colorado, exercise in cold weather can be a challenge. Follow these safety tips for exercising in cold weather:

- Check weather conditions and wind chill before you head outside. Even if you're wearing warm clothing, wind chill can make exercising outdoors dangerous.
- 2. Be aware of frostbite and hypothermia. Frostbite can affect exposed areas like cheeks, nose, and ears. If you experience numbness or stinging in those areas, get out of the cold and slowly warm the affected area with lukewarm water or blankets. Hypothermia is evident by intense shivering, slurred speech, loss of coordination and fatigue. If you suspect hypothermia, you should seek medical attention immediately.

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Capital Project Updates

s we reflect on 2023, we're excited to share the accomplishments and progress made by the Metro District in enhancing our community's infrastructure. We have been very busy this year! We completed several projects over the summer of 2023, including:

- Roadway Repairs: We completed \$2.7 million in roadway repairs. We appreciate the community's patience as we repaved the Gate 1 and Gate 3 entrances. Over the last 3 years, the District has "touched" approximately 85% of the lane-miles within the Village.
- Three New Wells: The District continues to make progress on the installation of pumps and motors for our three new wells within the Village. We expect this project to be completed this winter. We are spending over \$1.0 million on this important project. This project is an important project that will help improve the resiliency of our water supply.
- **Well A-12:** We completed rehabilitation on Well A-12. We spent approximately \$420,000 on rehabilitating one of the most important wells in our system.
- WTP Update: The District is making regulatory updates, process improvements, and technological updates to our Water Treatment Plant. We recently solicited proposals and signed a contract with an engineer to lead the design of this project. More information regarding this project will be forthcoming.



In closing, we're proud to share the impactful strides made by the Metro District in 2023. The completion of significant projects, from extensive roadway repairs to crucial well installations and system upgrades, reflects our commitment to enhancing the community's infrastructure. As we look ahead, we remain dedicated to delivering excellence and ensuring the continued prosperity of the Village. Thank you for your ongoing support and patience as we work towards a safer and more resilient future together.

Use Care Around Thin Ice



hin ice might seem tempting, especially for adults, kids, and dogs. But the consequences of venturing onto the frozen surface can be severe. Simply slipping and falling onto the ice can be painful, but plunging through the ice into cold water is often deadly.

Staying off the ice is the best plan of action. If your dog or someone falls in, don't try to be a hero. Stay on shore and call 911 instead. South Metro Fire Rescue's firefighters have the right equipment and special training for ice rescues. Firefighters typically use a four-step process to help rescue someone who has fallen through the ice:

- 1. Self-Rescue: When firefighters arrive, they try to talk to the victim in the water and coach them to self-rescue. Ice rescue is dangerous if the victim can self-rescue, then firefighters can stay off the ice, too. To self-rescue, find the ice edge where you fell in because it is the strongest. Put your elbows on the ice surface, kick your legs so they float behind you, and kick harder to push yourself forward and climb onto the ice. Once on the ice, roll on your side to safety. If you can't kick hard enough to get onto the ice, your arms will freeze on the ice, and keep your head above the water if you pass out from hypothermia or exhaustion.
- 2. Reach: Firefighters will attempt to reach out to you with a long branch, pole, or ladder.
- 3. Throw: Firefighters will throw a life ring, life vest, or rope at the victim to pull them out.
- 4. Row and Go: Firefighters may use a boat ("row") or crawl out on the ice ("go") to rescue you. The firefighters will wear special gear for protection, including a rope that connects them to rescuers who remain on shore.

Ice rescue is tough and dangerous. If you can self-rescue, that's great because it keeps everyone safer. But the key advice is simple: Stay Off the Ice!

Smart Winter Watering

In Colorado, we know the weather can be unpredictable – especially in the winter – and it can wreak havoc on your landscaping. Limited snowfall, low humidity, minimal soil moisture, and variable temperatures often damage trees, shrubs, perennials, and lawns. You should plan for winter hand watering (now through March) one to four times per month depending on the weather, temperature, and soil conditions. Many landscape plants grow roots throughout the winter and need moisture to survive. Drought-stressed plants are more vulnerable to disease, insect infestations, and branch and twig dieback, so consistent moisture is needed.

Right-of-Way (ROW) Permits Required in Village

Il construction work within the Castle Pines Metro
District right-of-way (ROW), which may include
streets, sidewalks, and trails, is closely monitored by
the District through a well-managed ROW permitting process
which includes permit review, management, and inspection.

The process assures safety for the traveling public, minimizes impacts, and maximizes efficient use of the ROW. The permit process also protects the District's investment in the infrastructure as excavations and disturbance to the roadway and landscaped areas are to be restored to their high-quality condition.

- 3. Dress in layers rather than bundling up. Use a synthetic material instead of cotton for your first layer, then add on a layer of fleece or wool. Your outer layer should be waterproof.
- 4. Take extra care to be visible since there's less daylight in winter. Wear reflective clothing.
- 5. Drink lots of water. Even if you're not thirsty, drink plenty of water before, during and after your workout.

Following these tips will help you enjoy exercising, even in cold weather.

Travel Safely
